### **Senior Cricket Report**

### Season Overview:

The cricket season of 2021 held some highs and lows for the club. It looked likely from early in the season that the first team would be fighting to avoid relegation. Despite a late revival it was too little and too late and the club will play next season in division 2. Despite relegation there were some highlights with four good wins and match winning performances in those games from Mark Burrows, Rob Lee, Jon Hawk and Ryan Price. Former captain Stuart Hawk and current captain Ben Hawker both had a couple of good innings and bowled well in some matches. Also, some of the younger players featured in the first team- Cameron Harvey, Charlie Stanley and Todd Stevens all acquitted themselves well.

We found ourselves relegated because of player availability and a key for next season will be to attract two or three experienced players of first team standard to prevent the situation we faced

this season, whereby a number of players only played just over half the matches. The situation we faced is not fair on the other first team players, the second team and the captains. Captaincy is a hard job but made so much harder by trying to finalise teams from selection on Monday to match day on Saturday.

One knock on effect of player availability was the second team who looked likely to top the table at one point early in the season, having to win one of the last two matches and hope other results went there way to avoid relegation, which they achieved on the last match day. There were some great performances in the second team especially from Rick Wrigley and in particular from our younger players.

Practice sessions were well attended for most of the season, numbers tailed off towards the end. Josh Blunt did a good job helping players develop and Josh quietly helped, supported and challenged players to improve. Everyone has a view of how Thursdays could be best used, for my part I would like to see more players consider how practice could be purposeful and use the net sessions to work on areas to improve based on their performance during matches. We still have a few who come along just to try and hit every ball as hard as they can.

Thank you again to the three captains Ben Hawker, Ben Hansford and Justin Gray for all the extra time they put in to make sure we had full teams and for the skilful way they led their players.

The Strollers had another successful season with a full programme of matches and an opportunity for lots of different players to play a game. Thank you to Chris Chattaway for his enthusiastic captaincy and organisation. At the other end of the spectrum the juniors at all age groups and the Friday night All Stars, Young Tons and girls training were all successful. Thank you to all the youth coaches and to Dave Glover and Tony Boardman for coordinating and managing so much of the cricket we provide for an incredible number of players. Thanks also to John Raybould and his team of assistants for all they did during the season to prepare pitches and the ground. It wasn't an easy year with the number of wet weekends they had to deal with.

As many of you know, I am standing down from my role as Chairman of Cricket. To effectively take on this role, you need to be available every Saturday and of course with my umpiring commitment this hasn't been possible for me. I knew when I took this role on that would be the case and I imagined stopping umpiring at the end of the season. However, when we got to that stage I realised I wasn't ready to give up umpiring at premier league level hence resigning from on the job, just so the captains have another viewpoint to consider. Thanks to Andy Farmer and Richard Dunn and anyone else who assisted by passing on their views to me each week during the season. Enjoy the rest of the winter and best of luck to all players for the 2022 season.

### First XI report:

I'd like to start by thanking every player who has represented the 1st XI this season, as well as all the parents, grandparents, significant others etc who have supported the players and the team this season. I'd also like to thank all the club officials who have once again made cricket a possibility during the season. Your effort and commitment to the club is very much appreciated and certainly does not go unnoticed.

A return to the 'normal' league structure this season was welcomed by all, even if it meant embarking on our annual pilgrimage to Burhgill! Indifferent availability this year played a large contributing factor to what was a disappointing season results wise, and ultimately lead to the 1st XI being relegated from Division 1.

Results notwithstanding, there were a number of positives that the team can take from this season and into next season. There has been a significant increase in the number of 'youth' players who have represented the 1st XI during the 2021 season, many of whom making their debuts. Charlie Stanley, Cameron Harvey, Todd Stevens, Benedict Gray, Adam Burrows, Ayran Jagadish and Laurie Heilbronn have all made contributions to the side at various points across the season and I look forward to them adding to their 1st XI caps in the future. Special mentions to Ronnie Ball and George Bartram who completed their first 'full' seasons in the 1st XI, a great achievement by both players and I have no doubt they'll be better players for the experiences they have had this season. Ronnie's 42\* away at Burghill was particularly pleasing and George's spell of 4 for 38 at home to Pedmore was a great display of seam bowling.

Scattered amongst some performances the team would rather forget, were some very encouraging results. Three consecutive victories against Feckenham, Pedmore and Worcester Nomads in late May, early June showed the quality and togetherness within the group. Likewise, our final day victory away at Coombs Wood was an excellent way to round the season off and provided us with the champagne moment of the season with part time first choice left arm spinner, Ryan Price, taking a match winning 6 for 57.

There have also been some individual performances this season to be celebrated. Stu Hawk (263 runs) and Mark Burrows (262 runs) combined on a number of occasions throughout the year to dig the side out of a hole or to push the total on further. Jamie Mackenzies 239 runs in 8 innings coming at a strike rate of over 100 often getting the side off to a brisk start. With the ball, Rob Lee led the way with 22 wickets including a match winning spell of 6 for 30 against Feckenham whilst George Bartram narrowly pipped Rob with the best average, his 16 wickets costing him 26.4 a piece.

From a personal point of view I'd just like to say a massive thank you to all the players, parents and club officials for their support during my first season as 1st XI captain. Special thanks to the captains of both the 2nd and 3rd XI's Ben Hansford and Justin Gray for their support, and also to Paul Shannon. All the support throughout the season has enabled me to focus the majority of the attention on on-field matters and this has been greatly appreciated. In spite of results, it has been an absolute pleasure and honour to captain Belbroughton 1st XI this season.

I have absolutely no doubt that the 1st XI will come back stronger next season and we're all certainly looking forward to the challenges that Division 2 will bring, as well as visiting some new grounds! Once again, a massive thank you to everyone who has played a part in the 2021 season, I look forward to seeing you all again next season, but in the meantime I wish you all the best of Winters

Firstly, on behalf of the second team, thank you to all the Committee, Ground Staff, volunteers and supporters who make playing possible, as well as ensuring the Club remains a social hub for so many people. Not just providing a place to play and enjoy cricket. But to so many people, the Club is important for their social, mental and general wellbeing. This is especially more important than ever over the last two years.

Thank you also to my vice captains, who have been even more important to me following changes to my circumstances, along with senior players (and ex-players) who have supported me through the hardest of seasons.

We continue to create an environment that is fun, inclusive and competitive. –hopefully we are bfinging through young players in a safe environment that are ready to take the next step up. Balance is essential, in what is a competitive league (and will be even more so next season) and the balance of old and young creates a wonderful squad to captain. Unfortunately availability was particularly difficult in 2021, which can be seen by our inconsistent results, but grab a cup of tea and enjoy a run through of the season below.

The prospect of a full season after 2020's shortened affair saw us travel to one of last year's strongest teams Himley for the opener with win-lose, 45 over matches, the format for the season and a revised bonus point structure the format for the season.

A MacKenzie (82) and S Thomas (65) saw us off to the very best of starts with a wonderful opening partnership of over 100, before solid contributions from Dunn (26no), Wrigley (28) and Hansford (19no) which saw us post 250-3.

Despite taking regular wickets, including a fantastic display from B Gray (4-42), the regular flow of runs and poor control in the bowling saw Himley win by 3 wickets with 21 balls to spare.

Our first home game of the season, against eventual title challengers Stourbridge, saw us post a commanding 273-4, including a sparking 112no from Wrigley, 51 from Dunn and 39 from Hansford. Two early wickets and a brutal display of fast bowling from C MacKenzie (5-32) saw off any challenge dismissing the visitors for 178 and a comprehensive 95 run win.

A damp visit to Old Vigornians, on an uncovered, used pitch, saw a match as dismal as the weather, with Belb limping to 137 all out despite a gritty 37 from A MacKenzie and the only brightness of the day a sparkling, cameo 43 not out from B Gray. The regular leaking of runs through poor bowling discipline (a feature that remained throughout the season) again out paced the regular taking of wickets, seeing us lose by 3 wickets with 15 overs to spare. Young Todd Stevens taking his first 2XI wickets (2-11) along with George Flowers (1-14) a highlight on a dark, cold day. C Karvaski (2-17) the tightest of the bowlers picking up a brace.

After a couple of washouts, the end of May saw us pick up comprehensive wins against Stourport and Enville. Stourport seeing vice captain Wrigley post a magnificent 109 in testing, damp conditions ably supported by Harvey (41) in a strong posting of 221. Regular wickets flowed with Spells (2-23), Stevens (2-23) and B Gray (2-31) all contributing, before G Flowers mopped up the tail with an impressive 3-25.

G Flowers continued in the wickets at Enville, taking 3-14 who with Wrigley (3-38) broke the back of their batting, another tight spell from Karvaski (1-22 off his 9) saw Enville finally dismissed for 130. Our top 4 seeing us home with solid contributions, notably Wrigley (54), to win by 6 wickets.

The tightest game of the season followed at Pedmore who would go on to become champions. The Pedmore attack proved to be the tighetest of the season but a classy 71 from Dunn and a journey finally worth it for Kates (46) before a late flurry from Hansford (33) saw us post a score of 202. Leaking runs faster than wickets (as usual) Pedmore were cruising until a tight spin bowling display from Karvaski and Wrigley, saw them bowl in partnership 18 overs for 46 runs to turn the screw. With young Ayran Jagadesh handed the ball for the last over, picking up a key wicket and bamboozling Gibson their captain with a fine display of death bowling to see Belbroughton win by 3 runs.

Unfortunately availability began to hamper all the teams come mid June, and a much changed side saw us rolled for 169 at home to Alverley, despite a resilient and then big hitting finish from R Greatbatch (40). Our bowling was toothless and saw Alverley win by 6 wickets with 8 overs to spare.

Our best display of bowling and fielding of the season saw us roll Old Swinford at the bowl for 90, with C Mackenzie doing the damage up top (3-7 off 5 overs) and J Glover ripping the middle order out (3-12 off 6) before Kates (47no) and Heilbronn (30no) saw us home with a marvellous display of batting seeing us win comfortably by 10 wickets.

The last game of June saw us unable to follow up the win (another story of the season) as we travelled to Bromyard, steady wickets, but aggressive batting saw Bromyard post 222 all out (44.5 overs) on a tricky wicket. (C Mackenzie 2-39, Heilbronn 2-31, Stevens 2-16 and Cook 2-34 all contributing well). Promising starts from Dunn (31), A MacKenzie (13), Kates (13), Parker (26) and Hansford (18) all failed to go on, probably only needing one of them to reach 50 after a solid 25no from Glover saw us limp to 180 from our 45 (but securing what would prove to be an important batting bonus point).

July would prove to be an important month, with 5 games and entering the month in the top 5. Summer availability hit the club badly, and only winning one of those 5 proved to be the turning point of the season resulting in us looking at the bottom of the table for the rest of the season.

Beginning with a close run chase of Himley's 182 (C MacKenzie 3-21) and falling just short on 173 (Dunn 37, Heilbronn 25, Thomas 22). Followed by a sour 192 defeat to Stourbridge. Then posting 230 against Old Vigs (Wrigley 79, R Greatbatch 72no) before very poor bowling and fielding saw us succumb by 10 wickets.

The highlight of July was in defeating a strong Barnt Green side on a sunny day at the Bowl. Restricting a strong batting line up to 188, with a wonderful fielding and bowling display. Langdon (2-35), Stevens (3-19) and Wrigley (5-31) saw us take regular wickets. Despite being 0-1 then 39-2, Dunn (39), Wrigley (56) and Hansford (45no) saw us home by 5 wickets with 4 overs to spare against a strong bowling attack.

Typically, we couldn't follow up another good win, but this time in more frustrating circumstances in a heated local battle with Hagley, that eventually turned on a poor decision by the standing

umpire that left a bitter taste all round. In damp conditions and a soft Hagley wicket, Belb posted a respectable 180 (again, what would turn out to be an important extra batting bonus point). MacKenzie and Thomas setting a solid foundation (26 each), before Hansford pushed on towards the end (56).

Hagley were cruising a 105-2, but regular wickets saw them collapse to 130-5 then 133-6, 152-7 then 164-8. At this point the poor umpiring decision, that would have seen them slip to 164-9, didn't go our way, and Hagley eventually won by 2 wickets.

Availability then saw us kick off August with two heavy defeats, to Stourport then Enville, the only notable performances being Ben Spells taking 2-49 and scoring 37 at Enville in a welcome return to form. Rain washed out the return fixture against Pedmore before a relegation battle against Alverly away.

In a must win game, we won the toss electing to bat. Posting a solid 213 all out, including 56 from Wrigley, 45 from A MacKenzie, 23 from Hansford and a late but important 16 from C MacKenzie. In response, young Todd Stevens, who had chpped in all season with regular wickets, removed the opener in his first over shortly followed by the number 3. Tight spells from Luke Ranasinghe, Benedict Gray and Connor Karvaski saw us restrict Alverley to 197, moving us clear of the relegation battle and a little breathing space with two games to play.

Old Swinford away followed, posting a below par 192-5 (Hansford 58no, Malanphy 38, Dunn 37, Thomas 27) which Old Swinford knocked off with ease winning by 7 wickets with 7 overs to spare. Meaning we needed a win, or results to go our way in the final game of the season at home to Bromyard.

Batting first we posted 202 all out, with Wrigley (54) and Dunn (45) solid in the middle order. Despite good spells from Harvey (2-39) and Spells (2-47) we lost by 3 wickets with 3 overs to spare.

All in all, a rather frustrating season. Strong wins, followed by losses we should have won. Some amazing days, notably the wins against Pedmore and Barnt Green, who went on to become the promoted teams.

But more importantly, a fun environment, great company and proud to play our part in an amazing club.

In the close season, discussions have taken place with our coaching partners, on how we can improve the relevance of the sessions to focus on the basics of batting, bowling and fielding with more coach intervention to eradicate bad habits, improve skills on a progressive basis.

Friday evening All Stars, Young Tons, Under 11 and Girls practice sessions were regularly attended by 120. For the first time these were extended until the end of July which resulted in a significant uplift in food and beverage sales on those nights. Thanks to Mick Ross and Debbie Burrows behind the bar and the excellent waiters and waitresses (especially the Head Sommelier!!)

Also special thanks to David Glover and Jill Turner for organizing and communicating with parents and coaches. We received very positive feedback from a number of parents about our Friday night training programmes. We also successfully launched our masterclass programme for our U13-U18s who were already playing senior cricket, thanks to Paul Shannon for overseeing this.

With the help of one of our coaching partners Complete Cricket, we launched Young Tots, a programme giving 3 to 5-year-olds their first taste of playing cricket with their parents in a fun and safe environment. 20 boys and girls signed up.

The Summer Camp was organised by David Glover and proved a success as we received 180 plus day bookings from parents of children aged 6-14 over the 6 days we ran our camps. We have also received 8-10 expressions of interest to join the club as a new junior member.

With these numbers and the feedback received, we will be organising the camps again.

The Youth Presentation day on the 30st August was successful with two inter club games, one involving the Under 11 Boys and Girls -the other a keenly contested 100 ball match between the Under 15's and Parents. Our thanks to all those who contributed to the day, making it a friendly family atmosphere.

The progression of Youth players into the Senior ranks has continued with several establishing themselves in the First XI, another group moving into the Second XI and more young players from the Under 13's became regulars in the 3<sup>rd</sup> XI. The use of "developmental' Sunday friendlies, also provided the opportunity to 'blood' Junior players alongside a number of experienced players Thanks goes to all the Senior Captains and Paul Shannon who have assisted the integration of the younger players so successfully and the awarding of their prestigious Club caps

This season, many home and away games were cancelled/deferred due to weather or lack of availability within one or both of the teams in some cases. This was often because, as lockdown was lifted, parents took their children away on UK holidays and breaks at relatively short notice which often torpedoed managers' plans and decimated availability. In total there were 16 cancelled or unfulfilled matches AND 3 conceded matches.

### **Review of the Season**

**Under 15**-A decent outturn given that historically this squad needs players to play up 1-2 years to get an 11 a-side team out and historically played in the bottom tier of the Sunday County League. Four of the actual Year 11's only played 3 games or less. It's likely that we will only have 2 U16's "on the books "next year based on feedback received and historical trends.

**Under 14**- Had a good league season which started really well but tailed off following 3 defeats to Wolverhampton and Himley. In 2022 the Youth Committee has agreed that more "fringe" or younger players should play in the U14/15s pairs competition.

**Under 13& Under 12**-Both teams had disappointing seasons and whilst there are several talented players who have played senior cricket or have the capability to play senior cricket, as teams, they have not progressed. The Managers have reached the conclusion that "a back to doing the basics right" coaching sessions are needed during the 2022 Winter and Summer practice sessions, using the parental support that has been offered in order to improve the players' skills and hopefully make the teams more competitive particularly as this season's U13s as U14s next year move to 11 a-side cricket.

Under 10 & Under 11- Given that we only have 5 Under11's/Y6s and 6 Under 10's/Y5s and most of the players are very much in early hard cricket ball development, it isn't surprising the Under 10's won no matches and the U11s only won once. The Youth Sub-Committee have acknowledged that these age group squads need augmenting by recruitment or via development of Y5 and Y4 players. A relevant positive factor is that a number of talented Y3s and Y4s who are now comfortable playing hard ball cricket supported the older age players. This bodes well for the future. However, based on feedback from the teams' managers it is clear that the club must also focus on these age groups' training programmes many of whom suffered from playing no hard ball T20 cricket in 2020 and provide a tailored coaching programme to ensure they get the very basic/simple things right.

**Under 9 Incredi-ball squad**- This team finished equal top of its 4-team division with an experienced Hagley side, losing out on a place at the county finals on R/W. This was an excellent outturn as every Young Ton (we had 40+) had the chance to play in at least 1 tournament. A number of Year 3 and 4 boys have also already played for the U10s and U11s teams.

Girls Under 9, Under 11 and Under 13. Given the absence of any Girls cricket last year and with Sophie Hancox and Rob Lee having effectively to re-establish Girls cricket from scratch, the future direction of travel looks very promising for which Sophie and Rob must take great credit. We entered an Under 9s Girls only tournament for the first time and came second. Our Under 11s (made up of mainly Year 5s) battled away and started winning despite being in a tournament with Bromsgrove and Bewdley, both who are longer established and acknowledged Girls cricket clubs. Availability was a real challenge for the Under 13s Girls matches and the teams in this competition only played 3-4 games each. The Under 13s also faced stronger and more established clubs in this competition.

### Senior Cricket Steering Group 2021 Report.

The first face to face meeting of the Senior Cricket Steering Group took place in May.

It was attended by Rob Hawk (RH)-Chair, David Glover (DG), Rich Bartram, Richard Dunn, Tom Oliver (TO) and Andy Farmer. Since this meeting the group have met regularly over the summer and after the season finished and since the initial meeting attendees have also included representatives from the Ground & Maintenance Team, John Raybould (JR) and Mick Ross, senior team captains, (BHw, BHa & JG), Paul Shannon (PS) and Chris Chattaway(CC).

The Group's terms of reference(TOR) have been broadly agreed in principle and the future direction of travel can be summarised as follows:

• >The Group is NOT/should Not be concerned with individual selection of persons- this is the Senior selection Sub-Committee remit

- \(\geqrightarrow\)TOR for this group is to present recommended time -related or aspirational objectives and plans for and provide the strategic direction including in response to captains requested "steers" for, cricket at BCC in 2021, if credible and reasonably achievable and in 2022 and beyond.
- Target production of suggested plans which are commented upon/reviewed by group including the Senior Selection Committee.
- Identify roles/responsibilities as the group evolves/to deliver agreed objectives/plans
- [N.B. It has been noted that the group may need to consider long-term at the relevant time how it dovetails development of Women's Girls cricket into this initiative]

The meetings have discussed a range of subjects regarding senior cricket at BCC including,

-Specific objectives for cricket contained in the 2020 Club Development Plan, 2021 Club Development Plan, League cricket requirements, Senior Net arrangements, Recruitment, Sunday fixtures and how will the Club, and what will be done by who and when to develop 16-21 year olds who play for the Club's senior teams

### Captains follow up to players' meeting

At a meeting attended by the Senior Captains in October, the comments aired at the players' meeting were discussed and reflected upon. As a result, it was agreed by the captains that

- -no new DOC should be appointed following PS' step down
- if say a parent had a grumble which wasn't resolved with the relevant Captain, the matter should be referred to this group/RH for resolution.
- the Captains and VCs would not require a chair for the selection committee.

### **Availability**

Given the challenges faced over the summer with availability it was agreed that the "general availability" of individuals who had played senior cricket would be checked. See Appendix 1 for full Saturday and Sunday survey results sent to captain(s).

Saturdays- 75%-100%- 23 of 39 surveyed. 50%-75%- 8 of 39 surveyed. U13-U18 Saturdays. 75%-100%-5.50-75%-8 U13-U18 Availability on Sundays.-75%+ or 25%.(A number of replies from these parents expressed interest in their sons playing some or only shorter format matches on Sunday.)

It was agreed based on the feedback from the captains that:

- availability on Saturdays will be similar to last season and,
- -numbers might be particularly challenging in May and June.

### 3rd's home Saturday fixtures

The Group's preference for 3<sup>rd</sup> XI matches is that they are played at home on Sundays or at Stone CC.

### Winter Nets.

Senior Winter nets have been booked for 7 Sundays. Availability is dependent on the school having a site manager available by 31/1/22 to open up the hall.

### Summer Nets.

It is proposed by BHw that the 1st XI squad train in the nets on Wednesdays and have fielding drills on Thursdays. BHw/BHa requested nets be organised by say a "player coach" and/or TO/PS instead of paying an external coach. Agreed the AK masterclasses in the summer for the U13s-U18s etc should continue.

### **Sunday Captain**

Agreed that a permanent appointment should be made to help achieve young player development objectives.

### Sunday Friendly X1/Sunday cricket-see also 3rd's home Saturday fixtures above It was agreed in principle that this team should be used, and selection made on the basis to get

senior players "back into nick" and develop younger players for senior Saturday cricket.

Following feedback about shorter form Sunday cricket it was agreed that consideration should be given to splitting the Sunday fixtures into Sunday Academy Development XI 40 over fixtures (e.g., Bewdley/Avoncroft) and shorter format matches.

### Strollers' weekday and Sunday pm senior & junior fixtures

After a detailed analysis and discussion of accommodating increased numbers of junior fixtures without diluting Strollers or credible Sunday XI fixtures, the following principles have been agreed by the group including following input from T0,DG, JR and CC:

- -Strollers Home fixtures would start Whit week 2022 and subject to the next point continue on Wednesdays as normal.
- -CC would make 3 fixtures against stronger opposition (e.g., the "Dooley XI"), a "club fixture" with the team being 50% Strollers and 50% 1<sup>st</sup>/2<sup>nd</sup> XI players. These fixtures would be moved to a Thursday to free up a Wednesday in each of June, July and August.
- -The arrangements for Thursday training will need to be planned in advance once the logistics for senior cricket practice sessions are agreed by the captains at a future Steering Group meeting.

Going forward, once CC finalises the Strollers fixtures for 2022 and circulates details to TO,DG and JR,TO/DG will then liaise periodically in February/March 2022 to agree availability for Sunday afternoon Youth matches and festivals to enable TO to then schedule Sunday Dev X1/other senior matches.

### Player recruitment including player coach/overseas player

RH is hopeful via the contacts/network he has to secure the services of an overseas player

### Improving playing surfaces-future plans of the Grounds team

JR will now be preparing 1st XI wickets 10 days in advance and watering the square based on Chris Longmore's advice including deep spiking the square to address the inconsistency of bounce and carry.
